

Not only has she participated in multiple and various economics workshops, but she has served as a trainer for the High School Economics workshop since 2010, received Teacher Grant awards to incorporate economics projects into her classroom and participated in multiple Economics/Personal Finance Challenge competitions.

As a MET, Loyd will serve as a "resource extender" to Economics Arkansas by providing professional development in economics and personal finance to other teachers across the state. Those training opportunities will take place after regular school hours in the evening and during the summer break.

exemplary educator with creative ideas who will be one of our premier presenters of the required high school economics class."

Loyd has been a 9th grade social science and economics teacher in Cabot for more than 20 years. One of her most popular and effective classroom lessons involves making "fluffer nutters," a yummy concoction of graham crackers, peanut butter and marshmallows, to demonstrate the law of diminishing returns.

Economics Arkansas launched the MET program in 1992 as a choice initiative to recognize outstanding economic educators who could serve as resource extenders for the staff. Economics Arkansas is one of the few economics councils in the nation that offers this type of recognition program to a unique group of teachers dedicated to promoting economic and personal finance literacy. CHOICES FOR VOLUNTEERS!

conomics Arkansas recently signed a pilot agreement with Choices Education Group to deliver the CHOICES program to students in Arkansas during May. Pending the success of the pilot delivery, we anticipate rolling it out statewide during the 2014-15 school year based on available funding.

What is the CHOICES program? CHOICES is an interactive, decision-making workshop that empowers teens to achieve academic success in pursuit of their career and life aspirations. This workshop is designed to help reduce the high school dropout rate, which currently reports 7,000 teens dropping out PER DAY in the U.S.

What has been the impact of the CHOICES program? Students give CHOICES an "approval rating" of 88%, and teachers give it 97%. In a 2009 study of at-risk students, those who participated in CHOICES increased their school engagement 47% more than those who did not, as reported by their teachers.

How is the program delivered? In two 50-minute sessions, local business and community volunteers take 8th or 9th grade students through realworld exercises on academic self-discipline, time and money management, and goal setting. Teens discover that they can take charge of their lives.



How can you help? Economics Arkansas will be recruiting business volunteers to facilitate the two 50-minutes sessions in classrooms around the state. Training will be offered by Economics Arkansas so volunteers will be confident when entering the classroom. April is Financial Literacy Month!

Did you know that nearly four in five adults agree they would benefit from advice and answers to everyday financial questions from a professional? (*Source: NFCC Financial Literacy Survey*, 2010) Currently, 17 states require students to take a personal finance course as a high school graduation requirement. In a show of support, Governor Mike Beebe has proclaimed April as Financial Literacy Month stating that Arkansas is strongly committed to supporting economic and personal finance education for all Arkansans.
