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
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# Excellence in Free Enterprise Award Honors Mike Duke, retired CEO/President of Walmart

I was also privileged to speak to our 720 guests during the event, and my foremost goal was to inspire the audience about economic education! Please see excerpts from my presentation at the luncheon below:

This spring, our staff and several volunteers presented the Choices Program to 8th grade students in central Arkansas. The program emphasizes staying in school, and the importance of investing in your human capital, along with other economic concepts and life skills. After the 2-hour activitiesbased presentation, one student said, "It really opened my eyes when you presented the high school dropout, high school graduate and college graduate scenarios," but the most powerful comment was, "Thank you for coming to spend time with us. I had forgotten my dreams and you reminded me of them." We all know that for our state and nation to grow and prosper, we need our students to have big dreams, and to have a vision for success.

Many of you have probably stopped at the Cracker Barrel in Alma – it is one of my favorite places to stop when I am traveling between central and NW Arkansas. I stopped in a few months close to the 4th of July, and I saw a painted picture in their gift shop that stopped me in my tracks. The picture was a serene scene of a rocking chair on the front porch of a cabin overlooking a beautiful body of water with an American Flag draped on the porch. The picture was lovely, but what it said captured my attention. It read, "May I never wake up from the American Dream."

This is what we do at Economics Arkansas. That is what economic literacy does – it helps students see themselves as participants in our economy and not bystanders. It gives students a vision of their own American Dream. You can probably guess that plaque is now hanging in my office.

# **Economics & Alternative Learning - A Great Idea!**

conomics Arkansas and the Bessie B. Moore Center for Economic Education-UA are working collaboratively with Lori Lamb, Dr. C.W. Gardenhire, and Deborah Bales with the Arkansas Department of Education Alternative Learning Unit to develop real world, project based learning kits to serve approximately 700 teachers, 400 programs, and 10,000 to 12,000 students in the alternative learning unit statewide.

The Alternative Learning Unit staff identified economic and financial areas to focus on that would be relevant and vital for students now and for their futures. A four tiered project based learning kit will be developed addressing the following topics:

- Investing in Human Capital
- Managing Finances
- Career Exploration
- Entrepreneurship

Components to be included in each kit: social skills, research, technology, current events/topics, activity based opportunities, economic and financial literacy basics and student projects as evidence of learning. The goal is to have these kits ready to present to the Alternative Learning Education Board January 9-10, 2015.




